FEAST OF ST. THOMAS – JULY 3



Thomas the Apostle (called Didymus which means "the twin" or Mar Thoma in Syriac) was one of the Twelve Apostles of Jesus Christ, according to the New Testament. He is informally called doubting Thomas because he doubted Jesus' resurrection when first told (in the Gospel of John account only), followed later by his confession of faith, "My Lord and my God", on seeing Jesus' wounded body.

Traditionally, he is said to have travelled outside the Roman Empire to preach the Gospel, travelling as far as Tamilakam which are the states of Tamil Nadu and Kerala in present-day India. According to tradition, the Apostle reached Muziris, (modern-day North Paravur and Kodungalloor in the state of Kerala, India) in AD 52 and baptized several people, founding what today are known as Saint Thomas Christians or MarThoma Nazranis.


After his death, the reputed relics of Saint Thomas the Apostle were enshrined as far as Mesopotamia in the 3rd century, and later moved to various places. In 1258, some of the relics were brought to Abruzzo in Ortona, Italy, where they have been held in the Church of Saint Thomas the Apostle. He is often regarded as the Patron Saint of India, and the name Thoma remains quite popular among Saint Thomas Christians of India.

In Paraguay, ancient tradition saved by Jesuits claims that Paí Tomé (as he is called in Guaraní) lived among the Paraguayan natives and preached the Gospel.

For more information about the legends and travels of St. Thomas, Wikipedia has an extensive and well-documented section on the saint and the various writings about him, especially in the early Church.

FROM THE REVEREND REDACTOR



Time is funny stuff.

When I was doing my graduate degree in philosophy (one of the Jesuit requirements) I concentrated on two items – human consciousness and time. One of the key statements when dealing with the idea of time is that “time is a coefficient of matter.” In other words, if there is ever a state in which no matter exists, time would not exist either.

Everyone knows (to one degree or another) the notion from Einstein’s works that time is relative. It can move faster or slower in different circumstances. Now what Einstein meant has nothing to do with how long an hour or an afternoon can seem when you are stuck in a dull meeting or held captive by a boring teacher. Nor does it have to do with how fast time can go by when you are with someone you love, or doing something you enjoy.

I was talking with someone the other day and we realized, with something of a gasp, that the “summer” is around half over. That wonderful period, when everything is supposed to slow down, when there is going to be lots of time to study and clean and read and relax, when we will all jump off the treadmill (social, communal, work) and stop and smell the flowers. Or the ocean. Or whatever there is to be smelled. Somehow, without realizing it, we’re just about at the halfway mark.

Part of that is because school starts early, so the “end” of summer is often the second week of August. But part is our own sense of possibility when faced with summer. Those possibilities are all real, and many are still within our reach. But in order to make them happen, we have to act. And we have to act now.

You were going to visit Petra or Machaerus or Gadara? Start now. You were going to clean the back yard, or put up a deck or study Arabic? Start now. You were going to exercise more, sleep more, spend more time with the kids – start now. Because before you know it, summer of 2017 will be only a memory.

The same thing, of course, is true for our salvation. Been meaning to do some spiritual reading? Start now. Been meaning to start going to weekday Mass more often? Start now. Been meaning to say the rosary every day? Go to confession? And so on.

Because before you know it, not only will summer be over but time will be over, and you will face God, and an eternity without time.
