

One of the aspects of this page of "Ramblings" is that it gives me great freedom. I can be theological, personal, introspective, occasionally (probably not often enough) funny) and I can use it to address a number of different issues, plans, concerns and even complaints. This is one of those.

WHAT IN THE WORLD ARE YOU THINKING OF??!!?

When I was a working actor in theatre – and continually as a member of an audience – one of my great annoyances was people who would leave the moment the curtain descended on the play, without having the courtesy to wait for the curtain call. Those actors or singers or dancers or whatever had worked hard to entertain, and the audience didn't have the courtesy to give them that Thank You, that acknowledgement that they appreciated their work. In New York, there are some who might actually have to catch a train. For the most part, it is people who simple don't want to wait in line to get their coat or to get a taxi or to be behind someone walking up the aisle. Again, as an actor, coming out to take a bow, and seeing the back of dozens of people leaving – not a great sight.

I liken it to the people who, as soon as the final blessing is delivered, are on their way out the door. They don't wait for the priest to leave, they don't get a copy of the newsletter, they don't have the courtesy to remain part of the congregation and sing the final hymn. Nope, OUT THEY GO.

Now I have two reflections. One is – it is simply rude. Impolite, discourteous, pick your word – but really? I know these people are not catching a train – I'm fairly sure they're not dashing to the airport – and the parking lot is quite large and the next Mass doesn't start for usually a full hour after we finish at Sweifieh, and there is lots of room in the parking lot at Freres, so physically getting out is not the problem. If these folks simply don't want to be involved with "other people," to spend a minute visiting with or getting to know others in the parish, then they need to look at their view of what it is to be a Catholic.

My other reflection is that while "technically" there is a dismissal – the Mass is really not over until the priest leaves. Just as the Gathering hymn at the beginning is designed to help bring us together as a community, so too the final hymn is a proclamation of our community of worship, our being a family, and we end as we begin. I know, there are also people who are habitually late for Mass – but those should be the LAST people to leave, not the first. Give God the full hour – and if you get to Church early (as you should, so you can quiet down and prepare for your participation in this great mystery) the "clock" doesn't start until the priest enters, and the Mass shouldn't be over for you until he leaves.

Give God the full hour – and be polite to your fellow worshippers.

And let us continue to pray for one another.
