


#### To make a US tax-deductible contribution


- 1) Make out the check to: UNE Province Society of Jesus

If you are able to make a tax deduction for contributions in dinars, we have to know that the contribution is from you (ie we cannot credit what you have put into the collection basket anonymously) and we are pleased to write you a receipt for your gift. Our understanding is that in some cases this is accepted and in some cases it is challenged. If you are making a gift in the name of a company or corporation, let us know the exact wording for the acknowledgement.









## RAMBLINGS OF THE REVEREND REDACTOR

IT'S HERE!!!! Well, almost. We've prepared, we've waited, we've prayed (hopefully), we might even have done some shopping, supported a bazaar here and contributed to a worthy cause somewhere else. Children have made lists and visited Santa in different locations, in our churches decorated trees and Christmas creche scenes have appeared – and it's almost here.

Please let us remember that Christmas Day is not the end. It is not the culmination, not the conclusion, not the climax. Christmas Day is the first day of the Christmas season, and the celebrations should continue until January 6, when we celebrate Epiphany. Even more, Christmas is the celebration of the beginning of the real presence in the flesh of Jesus Christ. (He had been in the flesh since the Annunciation on March 25, but now everyone could see Him in His flesh.) It is the celebration of our Redemption, because while we celebrate the act of redemption during Holy Week and Easter Sunday, this marks the beginning of our salvation, the fulfilment of the promise God had made long before.

So as packages are unwrapped and relatives visited, as dinner are prepared and consumed, as we gather in churches and raise our voices singing Christmas carols, let us celebrate the beginning – and continue the celebration throughout the whole Christmas season.

That, of course, is also good advice for January 7<sup>th</sup>. And all the days that follow. We blithely talk about "keeping Christmas in our hearts," or "living Christmas every day." It's a lovely thought, but it disappears faster than grandmother's ginger cookies or Aunt Mary's candy balls. It doesn't mean we give presents every day or keep our trees up until July (although – ahem – trees SHOULD stay up until Epiphany.) It DOES mean that we should remain conscious of the presence of Jesus Christ in our daily lives – not just the church events but in everything that we do. Our salvation is not an occasional event, it is/should be part of all that we do, every day.

Don't forget to write thank you notes (I can hear my mother's voice in my ear as I write those words) and remember that it is NEVER too late to remember someone with a call, a card or a gift. Even if you had forgotten them, that you did remember is the special moment that they will treasure. (And in case you were looking for a last-minute small present, don't forget the 2019 Parish Calendars – not only attractive, but useful and they will think of you each time they use it.

Another "end of the year" item: Please register in the parish, or update your registration. We will shortly be sending in out parish statistics to the Patriarch's office in Jerusalem, so if you have <u>not</u> registered with the parish, please do it before December 31, so we can include you and your family in our report.

It is not just at Christmas but true all the year long - let us continue to pray for one another, and all the people we serve.
