

I think I have told the story about my father, who was a very entertaining man but sometimes, especially at a cocktail party would – I have been told – talk a little too much. When that happened, my mother would slide up, and press a quarter in his hand. That was his signal to "Shut up."

I worry that you hear my voice too much – a weekly column here, and a different one on the website, homilies during the week and on weekends, classes, days of recollection – so this week, in honor of the Autumn that started last week, I thought I'd share someone else's writing, a Jesuit poet named Gerard Manley Hopkins. I made the 30-day retreat (which actually takes 40 days) at a retreat house in Wales where he lived and wrote many of his poems.

Hurrahing in Harvest By Gerard Manley Hopkins

SUMMER ends now; now, barbarous in beauty, the stooks arise Around; up above, what wind-walks! what lovely behaviour Of silk-sack clouds! has wilder, wilful-wavier Meal-drift moulded ever and melted across skies?

I walk, I lift up, I lift up heart, eyes,

Down all that glory in the heavens to glean our Saviour; And, éyes, heárt, what looks, what lips yet gave you a Rapturous love's greeting of realer, of rounder replies?

And the azurous hung hills are his world-wielding shoulder Majestic—as a stallion stalwart, very-violet-sweet!— These things, these things were here and but the beholder Wanting; which two when they once meet, The heart rears wings bold and bolder

And hurls for him, O half hurls earth for him off under his feet.

If you find him a little difficult, try reading it out loud. That is often a help when language gets complicated. It was a great help when I was in law school, and later in my Jesuit studies, when I was wrestling with philosophy. It was not that long ago that reading aloud in a group was a regular pastime, and authors would tour to read sections of their books. With no radio or television, a family might gather at night, and one of the members would read aloud. I remember my mother reading to us to help us fall asleep.

So as we welcome autumn, and the schedule seems to pick up and accelerate and suddenly there is no time to do anything – stop and read a poem out loud. Or a section of a book. Or a prayer. You may discover something new about the work, or the writer, about yourself or maybe even God.

Let us continue to pray for one another.

SAINT OF THE WEEK – ST. THERÈSE OF THE CHILD JESUS, OCT. 1 The "Little Flower" – Patron of Missionaries

I have always been fascinated that this is one of the earliest photographs of a saint. Therese and her sister were in the same convent, and their parents gave the convent a camera, so we not only have photos of her but shots of different aspects of convent life.

She was born in January of 1873. She had not turned 15 when she petitioned the local priest to let her enter the cloister at Carmel. He said no, as did the Bishop to whom she next went. The family went to Rome in 1887 to celebrate the Jubilee year, and had an audience with Pope Leo XIII. They had been



told not to speak – but the young girl threw herself at the feet of the Holy Father. She cried out, Most Holy Father, I have a great favor to ask you!...Holy Father, in honor of your jubilee, permit me to enter Carmel at the age of fifteen.'"

Father Reverony, the leader of the French pilgrimage, stared stonily at this bold little girl, in surprise and displeasure. "Most Holy Father," the priest said coldly, "this is a child who wants to enter Carmel at the age of fifteen. The superiors are considering the matter at the moment."

"Well, my child," the Holy Father replied, "do what the superiors tell you." "Resting my hands on his knees," Therese continued, "I made a final effort, saying, 'Oh, Holy Father, if you say yes, everybody will agree!' He gazed at me speaking these words and stressing each syllable: 'Go - go - you will enter if God wills it.'"

Therese did not want to leave the Holy Father's presence, so the papal guards had to lift her up and carry the tearful young girl to the door. But she did enter at age 16.


Her life in the convent is well-documented and well-known, but her spirit continued, animated by her deep love of God. Her motto – To love and be unknown – captures her life, and it is a testimony to that love that she is the secondary patron of missionaries, she who never left her convent once she was accepted. She died on September 30, 1890, and was canonized in May of 1925 by Pope Pius XI.
