



### RAMBLINGS OF THE REVEREND REDACTOR

In some ways, the Jesuit Center is a very strange place to live. There are always a lot of people around, there are often many different activities going on simultaneously, and while this is the "home" of the English language parish, the dominant language is, not surprisingly, Arabic. There is also the additional movement of people in and out of the JRS classrooms at the edge of our compound and some of the most interesting and unusual people and requests come to our door and our computers. We are sandwiched between two mosques, and the bells of the nearby churches sometimes seem to compete with the Muezzin for volume.

Jesuits are known as "contemplatives in action," and our lives often have that tension between the desire for prayer and the equally strong desire to be active. Over the last several months I have been involved in one of the programs that the Center has been running for several years, to involve refugees and others in the arts. In the past it was primarily dancing. This year the program expanded to include acting, stagecraft and singing, and instead of working for two months to create a production, this year we had several additional months for training.

It has been a wonderful experience. It has taken WAY more time out of my life than I had anticipated, but I have always loved teaching, and since to me, teaching and doing nightclub work are very similar, it seems I'm good at it. I've had the opportunity to meet a lot of people I would not otherwise have gotten to know, I've been part of an exciting and rewarding way of getting people involved with folks from other groups, and along the way, I have watched people take chances, learn not just new skills but new confidence, and seen them discover whole new horizons and cultures and possibilities.

And it has all taken place right here in the place where I live.

On January 26, the dancers and actors and singers and stage managers and crafts people will come together at Terra Sancta to show what they have learned since late August when this adventure began. There is a subtle ad in this newsletter with the pertinent details – including the fact that it is free – and I hope you might come and join us. It's not Broadway – and many of the participants are taking a chance in doing in public what five months ago they could not do at all. But I have seen rehearsals of the groups I didn't work with, and I have watched with the pride of a parent as beautiful moments have been created. There may be some problems or failures – that is part of the excitement of live theatre. But there may also be some very moving and touching and exciting moments, since much of the program comes out of the lives and experiences of the people who are dancing and acting and singing.

Lest you think this is simply a commercial announcement, it is also what the lived experience of being a Catholic ought to be about - helping other people be better in their own lives, in their own gifts. Helping other people come together. Sharing in the joy of growth and discovery. And being with others as they step outside their comfort zone and invite you to come along too.

So let us continue to pray for one another, and also for the performers on January 26.

#### **LATIN MASS**

#### SERVING AT THE ALTAR

## WELCOME

#### **FATHER ROBERT McCHESNEY, S.J.**



Jesuit Father Robert McChesney hails from a large Catholic family in Washington, DC and is a member of the Maryland Province of the Society of Jesus. He was ordained in Baltimore in 1981. He went to the Jesuit School of Theology in Berkeley (JST) in 2007 where he has been until recently. Before that, he served for eleven years with the Jesuit Refugee Service in the United States, as prison chaplain in a federal immigration detention center located in Los Angeles Harbor and as National Director of JRS/USA. He was a member of the Provincial Staff of the Maryland Province from 2003-2007. As Director of Campus Ministry at St. Joseph's University in Philadelphia from 1985-91, he served on the President's Cabinet and chaired the university committee which advised the President on construction of the Michael J. Smith Memorial Chapel.

At JST, Fr. McChesney had two jobs - Director of the New Directions Sabbatical Program, and Director of Intercultural Initiatives. The Sabbatical Program was founded in 1973 as the "Institute for Spirituality and Worship", and in 1990 was redesigned and renamed New Directions. Since its inception, the program has granted Certificates to more than 1000 alumni of 40 countries, including Religious, priests and laity, preparing them to return to the vineyard refreshed and with enhanced skills for the church of the 21st century. "Every semester the sabbatical program welcomes veteran missionary disciples from all over the world who are seeking personal and spiritual refreshment, fresh ecclesial horizons and new skills in ministry. They are a regular stream of wide ministerial expertise and good cheer into the larger learning community, and often serve as wisdom figures for the degree students. In turn, through interaction with the younger degree students the veterans go away renewed with vibrant hope that the church is in good hands."

In his capacity as Director of Intercultural Initiatives, he has overseen a program which offers annual course-based interreligious immersions to countries like Indonesia, Nepal, Israel and India. "In fact, because of its remarkable faculty and visionary institutional leadership, JST has taken the lead nationally in this area. Imagine a future where Christians, Muslims, Hindus, Buddhists and others interact more thoughtfully, amicably and even prayerfully! JST degree students have heard the church's call to explore interreligious frontiers and know that it's possible, because they've had the opportunity to learn how - in the classroom and library, but also in church, mosque, ashram, stupa and temple."

Here in Jordan, Fr. McChesney's primary focus will be Refugee Ministry, although he will also be available to work with programs at the Jesuit Center and Sacred Heart Parish, as his commitments allow. He also hopes to spend some time learning some Arabic. We are delighted to welcome him into our community here in Amman.
