January 4/5 – Solemnity of the Epiphany





RAMBLINGS OF THE REVEREND REDACTOR

This year, because December 8 fell on a Sunday, we celebrated the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception on December 9th. The date is really not important, since we have no way of knowing on what date this miraculous intervention took place. Just like Christmas, we celebrate the event, and the Church has simply selected a day on which this celebration should take place. I have a friend who was adopted, and the birth records, for whatever reason, were not available and so his new parents let him pick what day he wanted for his birthday. The Church has done that for us over the centuries where some of our feasts are concerned. Because the important thing is the event, and this one is perhaps the most misunderstood. There are three different events involved, and if you ask many Catholics, they will tell you that the Immaculate Conception is when Jesus was conceived in the womb of Mary.

Wrong. There is a Feast day when we celebrate that, and again, if you ask many Catholics what that is, they will answer Christmas.

Wrong again.

Christmas is when Jesus Christ was born. He was conceived when Mary said "Yes" to the angel, and that is celebrated at the Feast of the Annunciation on March 25, nine months before Christmas. The Immaculate Conception celebrates God's intervention in preparing Mary to be the Mother of God. While all human beings are born with original sin, it is inconceivable that the Mother of God would share in any sin, and so when Mary was conceived in the womb - by purely natural means - she was spared inheriting the original sin of our ancestors. She was conceived immaculate - without sin - so she could be the Mother of Jesus Christ. And since her birthday is celebrated on September 8, this celebration is exactly nine months before that.

As are so many things in our faith, there is logic and reason as well as tradition and Scripture in what we believe and what we celebrate. Contrary to the accusations of some, we are not a religion of "superstition and statue worship," and the more you know about our faith, the more you will discover and uncover these connections, these reasons, these wonderful intersection of events.

I know some have taken up the suggestion of reading one chapter of Luke each day during Advent. They are short chapters, and even if you haven't started - it's not too late to catch up. There are 24 chapters in this Gospel, so if you read one a day, by Christmas Eve you will have reminded yourself - or perhaps learned something - of the life and teaching of Jesus Christ. I discovered at least two things that I had "misremembered," that I had gotten wrong in the telling of the Christmas story. Always good to review.

May these remaining days of Advent be days of special blessing and grace for you and all those you love, and may Christmas bring to you the special joy and love that Jesus came to make possible.

And let us continue to pray for one another.
