

RAMBLINGS OF THE REVEREND REDACTOR

When I was chaplain at the military base in the South Pacific, one year someone had the bright idea of having an exhibition of nativity scenes. Many of the personnel on the base had been stationed in different countries, and so everyone was invited to share their collections for a couple of days. The big hall in the community center was reserved and over 100 nativity scenes from many different countries were on display. Simple ones and very ornate ones, sophisticated and basic – but all telling the same story. The organizers had music playing in the background, there was hot chocolate and cookies and candy canes – it was a lovely event, and then all the sets went back to their owners to be displayed in their homes.

One of the things I took away from that event was that Francis of Assisi had a very good idea when he set up the first manger scene. (By the way – do you realize that the English word "manger" is the same as the French word "manger" which means to eat? The Lord of the Universe who would give us His Body and Blood to eat was laid in the place where the animals came to eat. Another of the many little dimensions of the coming of Jesus that tickle my imagination.) Francis did it because many of his people couldn't read and had not really heard the story of the birth of Christ and this made it easier for them to visualize.

But in our time, our displays – and especially my memory of so many Christmas scenes – remind me that the face of Christ appears in different ways, and Jesus is present in each one. You may or may not believe that the Shroud of Turin is the burial cloth of Jesus; it may show us what the face of Christ looked like historically. But the face of Christ is present in our world in the people we see every day, and each Nativity scene has a different Jesus, a different Mary and Joseph – even the shepherd and the Magi reflect the society that displays them. They may not be "historically" accurate but they tell the story with truth and love.

As we reflect on God made man, divinity sharing in our humanity, we have to remember that Jesus came for all of humanity, and while He lived in one particular body in one particular time in one very specific place, His salvation is an invitation to all the world. As we look to see Christ in the stable – or the cave – or the hut – we see Him in many different faces. The invitation is to turn our gaze from the figures of the Holy Family to the reality of the people we see every day. Jesus is here in our world. And our call is to find Him.

Theologians talk of the three comings of Christ: the first in Bethlehem, when He was born of Mary; His coming at the end of the world, as suggested in the Book of Revelation; but in the middle there is the personal coming of Christ, as He makes Himself known to each one of us individually. While the importance of the first cannot be denied, and the inevitability of the last ignored, it is this middle coming that is so important to each one of us. WE need to find Christ not in a stable but in our lives, not in a pretty manger scene but in our hearts, not in a pageant or a video but in the real people around us. THAT is where Christ comes today and where we must be prepared to welcome Him.

I often think of the person missing from the manger scene - the one who said there was no room at the inn. It is too easy for us to echo those words in our lives – there is no room in my life, in my schedule, in my heart.

As we celebrate the birth of Christ, let us continue to pray for one another.

To make a US tax-deductible contribution

- 1) Make out the check to: UNE Province Society of Jesus
- 2) Send the check to Treasurer Society of Jesus 39 East 83rd Street New York, NY 10028
- 3) IMPORTANT Attach a note that this donation is for Father Sheehan and his work in Jordan.

If you are able to make a tax deduction for contributions in dinars, we have to know that the contribution is from you (ie we cannot credit what you have put into the collection basket anonymously) and we are pleased to write you a receipt for your gift. Our understanding is that in some cases this is accepted and in some cases it is challenged. If you are making a gift in the name of a company or corporation, let us know the exact wording for the acknowledgement.
