RAMBLINGS OF THE REVEREND REDACTOR

I ran into a very dear friend of mine the other day. She is a serious and dedicated Catholic, full of energy and a spirit of giving all year long that makes most Christmas generosity seem pale by comparison. I asked her how she was doing – this was a couple of days after Christmas – and she said, "I hate Christmas." I told her she was probably not alone in that feeling, although perhaps for different reasons.

You are allowed to hate Christmas. It doesn't make you a bad person, you are not turning into Ebeneezer Scrooge or the Grinch, and you will not be denied entry to heaven. Part of the problem is that with everyone around you being jolly and happy and full of "Christmas cheer" – or pretending like mad, if they're not – most people don't feel they can express the opinion that they "hate" Christmas. So they smile and make the appropriate noises, and run the necessary errands, buy the important presents – and all the while their sole wish is for the whole season to be over and done with as quickly as possible.

It is important to be very clear about what you are hating. I suspect for most people who would share the sentiment, they don't hate Jesus. They don't hate the idea that God loves us and sent His Son to be our Savior. And sometimes they can't easily explain what it is they do hate.

For some people Christmas has unhappy memories. A loved one who died around this time, and perhaps even very recently. Other bad experiences associated with this time of the year may surface. Some find the pressure to buy presents difficult, and the traffic and the crowds and the constant barrage of advertisements can very effectively kill the "Christmas spirit." Some people feel – not without evidence – that too much of the season is hypocritical. (Reminds me of a line from a Tom Lehrer song about Christmas: "The Christmas cheer you can't ignore - Your fellow man you must adore – you've time to hate him all the more, the other three hundred and sixty-four.") Expectations are high as "Merry Christmas" gets repeated again and again.

I don't know why my friend "hates" Christmas; I suspect it was a combination of family pressures and the contrast between what Christmas used to be, what society used to be, and how very different things are as we ease our way into 2020. I know she doesn't really hate Christmas because decorating is a passion and her joy in life is too obviously giving things to others and doing things for others and that's not just at Christmas but throughout the year. I was flattered that she felt comfortable enough to say that to me, to vent her frustration.

But notice that in everything I have said – the Baby Jesus was never really mentioned. Whether we share my friend's frustration or not, it is too easy to be distracted by all the trimmings and parties and decorations that start in October and create great expectations for "Christmas" – and that word alone has a range of meanings today. It is important that the focus – the "real" meaning – remains the Birth of Jesus Christ. Without that, the presents don't matter, the tree isn't important, the parties are boring and it is very easy to find ourselves "hating" Christmas. If Christ is not the center of Christmas – for all the days of the year – you're in trouble.


So make sure you know what Christmas means to you – what you <u>want</u> it to mean – and keep that firmly in view. The reason for the season? God loves you so much that He sent His Son. That's the whole thing.

And let us continue to pray for one another.

WEBSITE TRAFFIC - DECEMBER

In the month of December we had 2,638 visitors who made 8,032 visits to one or more pages on our website. Both visitor numbers and the pages visited are about twice what they were for the month of November. Consistently most visits come from computers registered in the US, 2/3 of that number from people in Jordan and slightly more than one-third of the Jordanian visitors come from Germany. Google is far and away the major sources of referrals, with more coming through that servers than all others combined.

OTHER STATISTICAL BITS

For those who like to keep track of such things, during Advent 57 people received the daily reflections, there are 51 who are members of our Facebook page "Parish Group," and 178 who receive HEARTBEAT electronically on a weekly basis. This year there are 14 candidates in the First Communion class, 13 individuals who serve on the Parish Advisory Council, and 27 who have indicated an interest in the Care for the Poor group.

The lovely poem to the left was dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and was written by J.R.R.TOLKIEIN, the author of *The Lord of the Rings*. He was a Catholic, but seldom wrote publicly about his faith, and this poem was recently discovered in the 1936 edition of an annual publication of Our Lady's School in Oxfordshire.

On December 31st I got a phone call from a woman who said she was standing outside our door and wanted a stamp for her passport. I had no idea what she meant, so I went downstairs.

Her name is Joanna, and she walked to Jordan from Switzerland, on her way to Jerusalem. She is taking part in a pilgrimage program, and the stamp is the evidence that she reached different stages on her journey. It is a spiritual exercise – but she is on her 4th pair of shoes.
