



## ADVENT BASKET COLLECTION




Advent is over and it is time to turn in your Advent baskets, so we can sort and bundle and get our contributions ready to be delivered.



# RAMBLINGS OF THE REVEREND REDACTOR

We will shortly leave the festive season of Christmas – the infamous 12 days of Christmas actually end of January 6<sup>th</sup> – and we return to "Ordinary Time." The celebrations are over, we return to work and to school, we return from visiting family or visiting family returns to their homes, we pack up trees and ornaments, write Thank You notes that we had forgotten or put off, we put the new clothes in the cupboard, the new toys take up residence with old toys and the routine of life asserts itself once again.

But it occurred to me the other day that for Catholics, there is – no offense to the Church calendar – no such thing as "ordinary time." We believe in the Resurrection of the Dead. We believe in the forgiveness of sins. We believe that each day on altars all around the world, a piece of bread and a chalice of wine become the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ, who is the Son of God. Every day in our lives is – should be – EXTRAORDINARY time.

Which leads me (as many things do) to questions. IF we really believe this – what difference does it make? How does it change or influence our lives? Would someone observing us know we are Catholics by the way we live and work and treat other people? As an old bumper sticker said, "If you were accused of being a Catholic, would there be enough evidence to convict you?"

On a recent "news" broadcast – and I put the word in quotes on purpose – an interviewer was asking people in the street about their New Year's resolutions. We heard people wish for (and I note in passing that what we wish for is not necessarily the stuff of which a resolution should be made) a boyfriend (or girlfriend), for peace in the world, for an end to violence. Now these are lovely thoughts, but the idea of a resolution is that YOU are doing to DO something. We also heard from people who were resolving to lose weight, to spend more time with their children, to read more and spend less time with the computer. All good resolutions, and unlike the first batch, all things that involved a personal commitment.

I noted, with a little sadness, that none of the people interviewed – or at least none that made it to the broadcast – talked about helping others, or going to Church, or working with the poor, or even trying to follow the Commandments. Religious comments may have been edited out, but I suspect that most people, in their resolutions, focused on themselves. Understandable, but it made me a little sad.

I suggest that being a Catholic should be less about what we want for ourselves (with the possible exception of eternal salvation) and more about loving and helping and taking care of other people (which is how we obtain eternal salvation). Not what we say, but what we do. Our lives should somehow be different <u>because</u> we are Catholic. Now that will be different for each person, but because we share a common faith, there should also be elements in each of our lives that we also share.

At a certain point in life, many people stop making New Year's resolutions, because they were not successful in keeping the ones they made the previous year. Go ahead – make at least one resolution. And then resolve to keep it. Stick a note on your bathroom mirror or on your computer screen to remind you. Keep a journal of your attempts. Rejoice when you succeed and try again when you don't. Don't be harder on yourself than God is – and He is always willing to let us try again. As I said in a recent homily – you and God, working together, can do practically anything. And that should make 2018 a very exciting year!

And let us continue to pray for one another.
