

### RAMBLINGS OF THE REVEREND REDACTOR

This week we celebrate the autumnal equinox – the first day of Fall – another moment in the official changing of the seasons – one of those times when many of us stop for an instant and ask ourselves "Where did the time go?" A moment when we realize how many of the things we were going to do during "summer" still remain undone.

Welcome to the reality of life. There will be some people, I am sure – although I don't know that I actually know any of them – who HAVE accomplished everything on their "To Do" list and can sit back with equal mixtures of contentment and pride as they survey their accomplishments. Speaking for myself, my life is more like the labor of Hercules that had him working in the Aegean stables – for every pitchfork of manure he shoveled out, two more flew in. I have been tempted sometimes to set up a hidden camera in my office, so I could record the paperwork somehow mysteriously generating more paperwork. There is always something more to do, something else to write, another event to try and schedule and promote.

I can hear some of you silently saying at this point – No sympathy. He doesn't have children.

True. Adding children to the mix makes life even more complicated, even more challenging, even more complicated – but (if my friends are to be believed) even more rich and rewarding and fun. Children do challenge us – with their energy and their curiosity and often with their lack of inhibition. They invite us not just to look at the world in new ways, but also to participate as we have perhaps not participated since we were children ourselves. Children open avenues of joy, and at the same time, they make us even more aware of the dangers and pitfalls that surround us. It is one thing to be able to take care of ourselves; when we are faced with taking care of others, especially children, it becomes a very different challenge and a much more serious responsibility.

Taking care of children is not just the responsibility of parents, but as a Church community we have the charge to educate and train and share our faith with the little ones. Several people have made great suggestions, including the possibility of a series of one-day trips for young people, sort of a mini-pilgrimage. In this issue is a proposal for a weekly morning Mass that would focus on children. I hope to have a Children's Liturgy of the Word before the end of the year, and maybe even a CCD class for children post First Communion and pre-Confirmation.

It says "...and a little child shall lead them." But as we follow the little child, we also must lead others, and none are more important than the little ones themselves. Those who are parents and teachers have this call, but anyone who wants to share their own faith can be part of this wonderful work. Think about it – pray about it – and then step out of the boat. Volunteer.


And let us also continue to pray for one another.

### SAINT OF THE WEEK – St. Vincent de Paul, September 27



When I started to put together this week's article about St. Vincent de Paul, the first thing that struck me was that, unlike a lot of other saints, all the pictures of him looked pretty much the same. He was born in 1581 and died in 1660, so there were no cameras. But the drawings and paintings are all clearly identifiable – which means he really looked like this, but also that he was very well-known in his day.

St Vincent de Paul was born in the Province of Guyenne and Gascony, the Kingdom of France. At 15, his father sent him to seminary but his interest in the priesthood at that time was to establish a successful career and obtain a benefice, with which he could retire early and support the family.

In 1597, he began his studies in the Faculty of Theology at the University of Toulouse. He was ordained on 23 September, 1600, at the age of nineteen. Because this was against the regulations established by the Council of Trent which required a minimum of 24 years of age for ordination, he resigned a pastoral appointment and continued his studies. In 1605, Vincent sailed from Marseilles on his way back from Castres, and was taken captive by Barbary pirates, who took him to Tunis. Auctioned off as a slave, his first master was a fisherman, but Vincent got sea-sick, and was soon sold. His next master was an alchemist and inventor. His master's fame became so great he was summoned him to Istanbul. During the passage, the old man died and Vincent was sold once again.

His new master was a former priest and Franciscan who had converted to Islam in order to gain his freedom from slavery and was living in the mountains with three wives. The second wife, a Muslim by birth, was drawn to and visited Vincent in the fields to question him about his faith. She became convinced that his faith was true and admonished her husband for renouncing his Christianity. Her husband became remorseful and decided to escape back to France with his slave. They secretly boarded a small boat and crossed the Mediterranean, landing on 28 June 1607.

After returning to France, Vincent went to Rome. In 1609, he was sent to France on a mission to King Henry IV. Once in Paris, he made the acquaintance of abbé Pierre de Bérulle, whom he took as his spiritual advisor. Later he served as a chaplain and tutor to the Gondi family, and the Countess de Gondi persuaded her husband to endow and support a group of missionaries to work among poor tenant farmers and country people in general.

On 13 May 1643, with Louis XIII dead, Queen Anne had her husband's will annulled by the Parlement de Paris which made Anne sole Regent of France. She nominated Vincent as her spiritual adviser, which helped her deal with religious policy and the Jansenism question.

In 1617, Vincent organized wealthy women of Paris to collect funds for missionary projects, found hospitals, and gather relief funds for the victims of war and to ransom 1,200 galley slaves from North Africa. From this would come the Daughters of Charity of Saint Vincent de Paul. In 1622 Vincent was appointed chaplain to the galleys. After some time among imprisoned galley slaves, he returned to be the superior of what is now the Congregation of the Mission, or the "Vincentians." These priests, with vows of poverty, chastity, obedience, and stability, were to devote themselves entirely to the people in smaller towns and villages.

Vincent was zealous in conducting retreats for clergy at a time when there was great laxity, abuse, and ignorance among them. He was a pioneer in clerical training and was instrumental in establishing seminaries. He spent twenty-eight years serving as the spiritual director of the Convent of St. Mary of Angels. Vincent died in Paris on 27 September 1660. (Continued on the next page)

His bones have been encased in a waxen figure which is displayed in a glass reliquary in the chapel of the headquarters of the Vincentian fathers in Paris. His heart is still incorrupt, and is displayed in a reliquary in the chapel of the motherhouse of the Daughters of Charity in Paris.

Among the many charitable organizations established in his name and his memory is the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul, dedicated to the service of the poor, established in 1833 by French university students, led by the Blessed Frederic Ozanam. The society is today present in 132 countries.

### **ASK FATHER JOHN**


In response to a distinct lack of interest, the "Ask Father John" session for the 24<sup>th</sup> (Monday) has been cancelled.

### **MASSES FOR CHILDREN**


