



When I started as the Executive Director and Chairman of the Board for the Xavier Society for the Blind in New York City, one of the first things I learned was that St. Lucy was the Patron saint of the blind. With that in my ever-expanding file of new things I learned, I decided we should celebrate, and I started the tradition of a Mass at St. Patrick's Cathedral on her feast day, with blind people doing the readings and bringing up the gifts. We did that every year but one. One year, the 13<sup>th</sup> of December was on a Sunday, and Cardinal Dolan was delighted with the idea of including our blind community. The Sunday Mass took precedence over the Mass of St. Lucy, but we had blind lectors and blind people bringing up the gifts and the Cardinal spoke eloquently about the work the Xavier Society had been doing since 1900.

The tradition I started has continued, and for several years we/they have had a blind priest as the principal celebrant, which is as it should be. This year the Mass will be held at the Francis Xavier Church, which is next door to the very first place where the Xavier Society was established. Again, this is as it should be, and I am delighted to see the tradition not only continuing but expanding. We have had celebrations where members of the St. Lucy Society participated, and one year at the Cathedral, one of the young ladies wore the headdress with lit candles. We had forgotten to notify Cathedral security, and when they saw the lit candles – on her head – they rushed to interfere but it was too late, and all went off without a problem.

This Rambling reminiscence actually has two points. The first is something I said probably hundreds of times while I was with the Xavier Society – a blind person can do pretty much anything a sighted person can, with the right training and the right tools. There are blind lawyers and doctors, blind professional golfers and even licensed airplane pilots who are blind. I have ridden in a car with a blind driver – and the car did not drive itself, he was completely in charge. Training and tools can make pretty much anything possible.

That's a good lesson for us, and not just that we should keep an open mind about others who might appear to have "disabilities" or who seem to be different. As we prepare to meet God – some sooner, some later – we are in the same situation. With the right training – catechism, spiritual reading, personal prayer, a spiritual director and the willingness to work – and the right tools – the sacraments, retreats, prayer again – we can do anything that the saints have done when they were alive. Jesus said the only thing we needed was a little tiny bit of faith, and we could move mountains. That we are NOT moving mountains says that we still have work to do.

The other "lesson" from my rambling is that it doesn't take much to start a tradition, something of value that continues after you have gone. You can be gone from a job, from a place, from being present to your family – but it is easy to start a tradition, which is usually nothing more than an action designed to take care of or to celebrate someone else, or maybe a lot of someone else's. Don't be shy about sharing your love or your ideas, your talents or your experience or your skills. You might start or be a part of starting something that will continue long after you are no longer a part of it. And isn't that a wonderful thing?

As we move through this great season of preparation, let us continue to pray for one another, and all the people we serve.

#### SAINT OF THE WEEK – St. Lucy, December 13




St. Lucy was a young martyr in Syracuse (Sicily) during the Diocletian persecutions of 304 AD. She consecrated her life to God and served the poor. The governor of Syracuse ordered her to burn a sacrifice to the emperor's image. When she refused she was tortured (most likely blinded) and killed. It is said that when her body was being prepared for burial it was discovered that her eyes had been miraculously restored. That is why she is shown with eyes on a plate but also eyes still in her head.

There are many legends that have grown up around this saint over the centuries but the known facts are few. However the devotion to her started shortly after her death and has continued to grow over the centuries.

St. Lucy is the patron saint of the blind and those with eyetrouble. She is also the patron saint of authors, cutlers, glaziers, laborers, martyrs, peasants, Perugia, Italy; saddlers, salesmen, stained glass workers, and writers and many places that carry the name Lucia. She is invoked against hemorrhages, dysentery, diseases of the eye, and throat infections. She is greatly honored in many Scandinavian countries where her association with light

balances the long dark days of winter. Her name in Latin shares the same root at the word for light (*lux*). Among the traditions associated with her is the wearing of a headdress with lit candles. A young girl dressed in a white dress and a red sash (as the symbol of martyrdom) carries palms and wears a crown or wreath of candles on her head. Her feast day is celebrated on December 13.

St. Lucy is an inspiration to always live unashamed of the gospel and stand strong in our faith no matter how much persecution we face. The palm branch that she is holding is a symbol of the triumph of good over evil, reminding us of the palms that were laid on the ground as Jesus entered Jerusalem on Palm Sunday.



#### **ADVENT/CHRISTMAS SCHEDULE**

There is an old saying – If you want to make God smile, tell Him your plans. But as far as we can tell right now, here is the schedule of events for Advent

December 1-22 – Each Saturday morning, following the 8:30 AM Mass, there will be a group reflection on

Advent and the preparation for Christmas. No reservation necessary, all are welcome.

December 2 – 23 – Every Sunday morning at the Jesuit Center, there will be a "quiet" Mass at 10AM. No singing. All are welcome.

December 15 – Following the 5 PM Mass at Sweifieh, a Christmas reception in the Church Hall.

- December 24 5 PM, a Vigil Mass for Christmas at Sweifieh, with the focus on the young people, although not a "children's" Mass.
- December 25 Mass of Christmas Day at the Jesuit Center at 10 AM. (Remember Christmas is a Holy Day of Obligation. The Vigil Mass satisfies the obligation.)
