March 29 - Daylight Savings time begins - clocks go AHEAD one hour





RAMBLINGS OF THE REVEREND REDACTOR

I got a phone call last week from one of the downtown hotels. They had a guest who wanted to come to Mass on Wednesday morning, and needed directions. Terrific. I gave them all the information and was pleased that the hotel was helping out the guest. A little later I got another call, from the visitor herself. She wanted to receive ashes for Ash Wednesday, so I broke the news that she was in the liturgical twilight zone, where Ash Wednesday this year comes a week after the rest of the Catholic world, as do all of the other celebrations for Easter and afterwards, right up to Pentecost.

Yes, it's confusing. But no less confusing than trying to figure out when Easter comes (unless you want to simply look it up) or when Ramadan will start, or at exactly what moment does the time change occur (Spring forward, Fall back). I worked for several years in the Marshall Islands, which are on the other side of the international dateline. When it was Saturday in the U.S. it was Sunday on Kwajalein. Our "weekend" was Sunday and Monday, so we would be coordinated with the U.S. I taught at a school that had a 6-day schedule and a 5-day week, so one week Monday was an "A" schedule, and the next week Monday was an "F" schedule, Tuesday was and "A" schedule and it kept shifting.

All this sounds very confusing, but the reality is when you live it, you get used to it, and you adapt. Newcomers to Jordan keep trying to figure out when the "weekend" is, and they quickly learn that the concept is fluid and it's better to simply not worry about it. We've gotten used to celebrating the Sunday Mass on Saturday — and here in Amman we even celebrate it on Thursday evening and Friday morning as well. The Sunday after Ash Wednesday we distribute ashes after Mass for those who could not make it to church on Ash Wednesday (but if you receive ashes on Wednesday, do NOT come back on "Ash Sunday"). The importance isn't the calendar date but rather the event. The ashes remind us of the penances we are supposed to willingly assume during Lent, and that our time will one day run out and we will return to the dust from which we were made.

Time is real, but the measurement of time is arbitrary, something we make up and all agree to follow. Growing older is real, but how you act and feel is up to the individual. Some are "old" at 55, and others are active into their 90's. How we deal with life is a good model for our relationship with God. We do the best we can with whatever happens in our lives; we try and find God in those same events, the good and the bad. There is an old song – and by "old" I mean even older than I am – *It Ain't What You Do, It's the Way That You Do It.* That can be true for a lot of life.

If you give to the poor grudgingly and with a frown, the poor still get the gift, but you've missed the point about giving joyfully. If you come to Mass because you "have to," you are, technically speaking, obeying the Commandments, but again, you're missing the point. If you visit the sick, or people in jail or any of the other corporal works of mercy (Quiz – how many are there and can you name them?) without love and joy, once more, you're getting the job done, but you're missing the point. Find God. Find joy and love and see Christ in the other people, THAT – I humbly suggest – is the point.

And let us continue to pray for one another.

Friday, March 15 – Friday after Ash Wednesday

Saturday, March 16 – Saturday after Ash Wednesday (Morning Mass)

First Sunday of Lent (Evening Mass)

And then we follow the regular Lenten schedule. Feast and Solemnities that are based on a date, like the Annunciation, are celebrated on that date. Feasts and Solemnities that are relative are celebrated according to the liturgical Orthodox calendar.
