

RAMBLINGS OF THE REVEREND REDACTOR

This week is THE week of our Catholic Faith. The liturgies of Palm/Passion Sunday, Holy Thursday, Good Friday and the Great Easter Vigil – these are at the very core of what we believe, and since the earliest days of the Church, these are the holiest, the most sacred, the most important of our worship services. These services are more important than a cocktail party, a reception, a request to work special hours – they are more important than an athletic event, a birthday party or a trip. If you find yourself saying, "Oh we can't make this service or that one" I think you should challenge yourself. How truly significant in the eternal scope of things are the reasons you would do something else besides be at the Mass of the Lord's Supper or take part in the veneration of the Cross or celebrate the great and joyful mystery of the Resurrection and the renewal of our own Baptismal promises. I admit – this is my opinion. I would hope it might be yours too.

I want to share a reflection I had the other day. When writing materials were scarce and expensive, they were not thrown out when a document was no longer useful. Whether it was papyrus or vellum, the ink would be carefully scraped off, and the document re-used, and this could be done several times.

Rather like our souls and sin. When we go to confession, in a sense, our sins are scraped off and we again become a blank page on which we get to write, using our lives and actions instead of pen and ink. When the page gets filled, God can scrape off the sins, leaving us once again cleansed and blank and open to new and hopefully more beautiful writings.

However, in our modern and scientific age, we have discovered that even when the ink was scraped off, often, with new imaging technology, experts are able to re-discover the original writing and even when there are several layers, they can re-create and re-read what was originally written.

So to with our souls. It doesn't mean, using this same image, that our sins have not been forgiven, that we have not been cleansed. Absolutely not. But it does remind us that when we sin, sin changes us. And the absolution of sin doesn't remedy that. We have damaged ourselves, and just as a document that has been scraped many times becomes weaker and more vulnerable, so too we, in our sin, become weaker and more susceptible to temptation. It doesn't mean God cannot save us, or that we cannot or should not save ourselves. But we have to be aware that we have changed, that we are somehow a little different, each time we turn away from God.

We need food and water to sustain life. We can go for long periods without food, and shorter periods without water. When we do, our bodies change, and when we repeatedly deny our bodies the food and/or water they need, we damage the cells in ways that cannot be completely repaired. There are consequences, and no matter how much water we later drink or food we eat, we have changed. So too with our souls. While God can and will absolve us from our sins, we have changed ourselves in ways we may not always understand.

In these final days of Lent, let us take advantage of the gifts we have been given – the Sacrament of Confession, the freedom to celebrate our faith in the great acts of worship of Holy Week and the Sacred Triduum, the absolute knowledge of the love that God has for us, if we are willing to take advantage of it.

And let us continue to pray for one another as we move to the great celebration of the Resurrection.

IFTAR DINNER HOSTED BY SACRED HEART PARISH

As we did last year, the Parish will again be hosting an Iftar dinner, on Tuesday May 14. The meal will begin at around 7:30 following the call to prayer. The guests will be predominantly refugee families, and members of the parish are invited to come as hosts. Most of the guests have some Arabic, and are always eager to practice but Arabic speakers are always helpful as well. A donation of 5 JOD is appreciated but not required but you must notify Fr. John in advance, so we don't get so many parishioners that we swamp the guests. Parishioners should plan an arriving by 7 PM. After dinner, there will be a free show of dance and music in the garden theatre for about 40 minutes.

PARISH ADVISORY COUNCIL

The PAC met on Tuesday night, April 16. After a brief review of the quarterly report from Fr. John, the major discussion of the evening was about a proposal for increasing the number of parish events, both local trips and international. The idea is to help parishioners both experience more of the local and regional sites and get to know one another better.

Among the specifics proposed were:


Local One-Day trips, like the invitation to the opening of the restored shrine of Our Lady in Anjara (see the following page)

Regional trips – including a weekend pilgrimage to Lebanon, with an option for extending the trip (tentatively scheduled for next November), and a Tuesday to Saturday pilgrimage to Malta (tentatively scheduled for September 17-21).

Mission trips – a possible trip to Thailand, where participants would help to build shelters, and local trips to help with refurbishing local schools or planting lemon trees and other fruit trees for poor families. More information will be provided shortly, but Individuals interested are encouraged to **PLEASE** contact Karim Mubarak (karimmubarak@hotmail.com) to indicate interest. No commitment, but we need to have some sense of what level of interest there might be.

Community Events – The idea of a Progressive Dinner was introduced, with three or four stations in private homes. One course in each home, and a bus to take participants from one venue to another. It has been done in the parish in the past, very successfully, and raised money for work with the poor. October was suggested as a time, and anyone interested should let us know, as either as a volunteer to help organize this or as a possible guest participant (Buy a ticket and eat!).

Possible sporting events, regular after Mass receptions and educational workshops were also discussed.

ADULT RELIGIOUS EVENTS

On the one hand, a number of people have asked about some kind of an adult group that could explore more learning and discussion about the faith. Call it Bible Study, Adult Ed or a fancy title – the idea is that as adults, we need to pursue our knowledge of the faith, and many feel a desire to share elements of their faith life, and to hear that from others. There is a Tuesday morning group that meets each week, and averages 10-15 at each meeting. We are currently going through the Gospel of John, and the topics vary greatly, depending on the interest of the group. We meet at Sana Dababneh's house from 11 to 12:30, and all are welcome.

But many cannot come during the day and so several weeks ago we offered a Tuesday night group and asked if anyone were interested. One person responded. One. Someone said that perhaps Tuesday was not a good night. Fair enough (although voicing that would have been a help). So we make the same offer – if there are people interested in being part of a similar group on a regular basis on Monday night – let Father John know about that. Or if another night is better and what your own interests might be.

The idea is that people come when they can – the group determines where the discussion and presentations go – Father John is available as a resource, sometimes as a teacher but members also can lead and discussion becomes a key part of the gathering.
